Course Description:

Goals of this course: At the end of the course, the student CAN

- 1. exchange basic greetings with his/her classmates, teacher and new acquaintances who also knows the Japanese language.
- 2. make a simple introduction of oneself, family members, friends and favorite personalities
- 3. ask and answer questions regarding personal information like name, age/year level, major, occupation, favorite things and daily schedule
- 4. understand and use familiar and very basic everyday expressions for shopping, ordering food in a restaurant, setting up an appointment with someone, telling a taxi driver about one's destination, borrowing something, asking permission
- 5. understand and use very basic sentences for describing favorite places, past experiences and present situation
- 6. read and write short and simple journal notes, articles, E-mails about familiar topics and can give simple comments/impressions about them in Kana and in some Kanji.

Class Rules:

- 1. Arriving 15 minutes after the class has started equals to 1 late. 3 instances of tardiness are equivalent to 1 absence. In addition, arriving 30 minutes after the class has started is equivalent to 1 absence.
