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about the department of Linguistics

The UP Department of Linguistics is part of the University of the Philippines Diliman College of Social Sciences and Philosophy. It was established on August 28, 1922, with Trinidad H. Pardo de Tavera as its first chairperson. He was immediately succeeded by Otto Johns Scheerer, who also founded *The Archive*, the official publication of the Department. The primary aim of the Department since its founding has been the scientific study, preservation, and promotion of Philippine languages & dialects through teaching, research, and publication.

As a CHED Center of Excellence in Foreign Languages, it is also dedicated to improving the teaching of national languages in Asia according to the needs of the Filipino people.

BACHELOR OF ARTS IN Linguistics

The University of the Philippines Diliman is currently the only university in the Philippines that offers an undergraduate degree in linguistics.

The **BA in Linguistics program** provides students with training in contemporary linguistic theories and methodologies for linguistic analysis, which will enable them to study languages scientifically for research, translation work, teaching, and other various purposes.

The undergraduate program in linguistics also encourages students to explore interdisciplinary connections between linguistics and other fields, particularly in the social sciences, humanities, and education.

Students can choose from among three plans of study where, along with developing their specialization in linguistics, they can also specialize in an East Asian language, a foreign Southeast Asian language, or select cognate courses in a related discipline.

Is linguistics all about learning foreign languages?

NO.

Linguistics is the scientific study of languages. It explores the nature of language by analyzing its inner workings and by studying how we use it in our everyday lives. Not all linguists are polyglots, but by learning skills and knowledge in linguistic analysis, you will be able to develop tools that might help you become one.

The linguistics program (Lingg) at the University of the Philippines Diliman was designed based on the mandates of the Department to continue developing as a primary center for the study and archiving of the languages and dialects in the Philippines and to contribute to general and theoretical linguistics by studying Philippine languages. Studies at the Department are therefore heavily centered on Philippine languages.

Nonetheless, all Lingg majors are required to learn at least one foreign language. Learning foreign languages allows students to gain deeper insights into their own native languages as they learn the languages and cultures of others. Doing so also develops their cognitive skills, as well as their cultural sensitivity and awareness.



Program Outcomes

Upon successful completion of the BA in Linguistics program, students are expected to be able to:

- demonstrate understanding of the concepts, theories, and methodologies used in the analysis of linguistic structure and patterns of language use in various cultural and social contexts;
- demonstrate understanding of the processes of language change and variation and the role of language in reflecting and constructing social identities;
- conduct archival and field research activities, including collecting, organizing, and analyzing linguistic data from diverse languages, to form hypotheses about language structure and/or human linguistic behavior, and to test those hypotheses against new data;
- contribute to constructive change in local communities by drawing on their profound awareness of the needs of culturally and linguistically diverse communities in the Philippines;
- promote awareness of the importance of linguistic diversity; and
- demonstrate proficiency in a foreign language through oral and written communication in order to conduct research in and on the language, compare and contrast linguistic features across different languages, and enrich their understanding of linguistic concepts as well as their awareness of diverse cultures, social traditions and perspectives traditions and perspectives.



Program of Study

Plan A

Aside from developing the students' knowledge in linguistics, this track allows students to study at least two foreign languages and take cognate courses in a related discipline. This track is ideal for students who want to combine their linguistics specialization with another discipline, such as anthropology, education, literature, history, math, sociology, etc.

Plan B

This track allows students to specialize in linguistics along with a foreign **Southeast Asian language**. Currently, only the Malaysian/Indonesian language program is available to Plan B students. This track is ideal for students who want to specialize in a language that is closely related to and share a lot of linguistic features with Philippine languages. Knowledge in a closely-related Austronesian language will be useful for students who are interested in historical linguistics and language change.

Plan C

This track allows students to specialize in linguistics along with an **East Asian language**. Currently, Plan C students may choose between Japanese and Korean. This track is ideal for students who want to gain a high level of proficiency in either of these languages, and plan to use one of these languages in their future careers or further studies.

RESEARCH DISSEMINATION

The Department supports the dissemination of research done by its faculty and students by offering them the chance to share their work & exchange ideas through various platforms:

- Philippine Linguistics Congress An international conference held every three years which brings together scholars actively engaged in the study of Philippine languages and dialects
- Linguistics Research Colloquium Held every August during the Department's Linguistics Month, the Linguistics Research Colloquium (LRC) is where we showcase some of the best works produced by the Department's undergraduate and graduate students. Faculty members also present some of their recent studies at the LRC.
- Linguistics Brown Bag Sessions An informal sharing of updates on working papers by junior faculty members, graduate students, and visiting research fellows.
- Asian Languages Forum The ALF features talks by instructors from our Asian Languages Unit on teaching and learning Asian languages. We also invite our students to share their experiences, strategies, and tips for developing foreign language proficiency.
- The Archive Journal This is the Department's official peerreviewed journal publication dedicated to the study of Philippine languages and dialects.
- The UP Working Papers in Linguistics Journal The UPWPL is an open-access online publication featuring preliminary research, reports on research in progress, and think pieces done primarily by undergraduate students and visiting research fellows.

Asian Language Extramural Classes

Extramural classes are open to UP and non-UP students, alumni, and working professionals. If you are interested in learning more languages or taking higher-level language classes-not for credit in the curriculum, but rather out of genuine interest or other needs- you may choose to enroll in our extramural classes. The registration fees for extramural classes are, however, not covered by the Universal Access to Quality Tertiary Education Act.

Summer Seminar in Linguistics

The Department also offers short courses in linguistics which are open to both UP and non-UP students, alumni, and working professionals. Courses may be on the application of specific methods for language research and analysis or the application of linguistics to other disciplines, such as language teaching, translation, etc.
